

Reflective Questions for The Slow Work of God — Faith in the Fire

1. What does God's pace reveal about His priorities for your life?

He's more focused on who you're becoming than how quickly you arrive.

"Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything." —James 1:4

God's timing isn't delayed—it's deliberate.

2. Why is perseverance described as an *active* form of waiting?

Because faith doesn't sit idle; it holds steady with expectation.

"The testing of your faith produces perseverance." —James 1:3

Waiting well means trusting God *while* you keep walking, not after He moves.

3. What happens inside a man when waiting turns from frustration to faith?

The heart moves from control to surrender.

"Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for Him." —Psalm 37:7

That shift—from demanding to depending—creates spiritual strength that lasts.

4. Why does God often work slowly when He could act instantly?

Because slow work refines, while quick fixes only relieve.

"He has made everything beautiful in its time." —Ecclesiastes 3:11

The process produces the depth you'll need to sustain the promise.

5. What does "delay is development" look like in your current season?

Can you see how God might be forming patience, humility, or deeper trust?

"The Lord will perfect that which concerns me." —Psalm 138:8

God's slow hand is still a steady hand.

6. How can waiting on God become an act of worship instead of weariness?

When you stop measuring time and start treasuring presence.

“My soul waits for the Lord more than watchmen for the morning.” —Psalm 130:6

Worship in the waiting shifts focus from *what you want* to *who He is*.

7. What shortcuts are you tempted to take while waiting on God?

We often rush to “fix” what only faith can form.

“In quietness and trust is your strength.” —Isaiah 30:15

Shortcuts may get you there faster—but they won’t make you stronger.

8. What would change if you trusted God’s pace more than your own plans?

Peace would replace panic. Confidence would replace comparison.

“Those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength.” —Isaiah 40:31

Trusting His timing is how men learn endurance—and how endurance becomes character.
