

Reflective Questions for The Unseen Servant — When No One Notices

1. What does Scripture reveal about God's view of "small" acts of service?

God measures greatness by faithfulness, not visibility. What seems small to men often carries eternal weight in His Kingdom.

"Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much." —Luke 16:10
God rewards the unseen because He sees the heart behind it.

2. Why does Jesus emphasize faithfulness over recognition?

Because obedience in hidden places reveals true devotion. Public applause fades; private integrity endures.

"Your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you." —Matthew 6:4
What's unseen by men is often most valued by God.

3. How does serving quietly train a man for greater responsibility?
