

Reflective Questions for When Applause Isn't Enough — Mask of Success

1. Why do you think men crave approval so deeply?

Because affirmation feels like identity when we've forgotten who we belong to.

“For they loved the glory that comes from man more than the glory that comes from God.” — John 12:43

Applause may fill your ears, but only God's voice fills your soul.

2. Who are you secretly trying to impress?

We all want to be seen — but approval becomes a trap when it replaces purpose.
